


BOARD OF GOVERNORS' ANNUAL REPORT TO PARENTS ACADEMIC YEAR 2023/2024

RELIGIOUS ETHOS 2023-2024

In an increasingly secular world, often charged with the sterility of merely functional or transactional educational outcomes, our College Mission Statement shines as a beacon of tradition and hope, a hope that our College men will charge the world 'with the grandeur of God' as the poet says. St. Malachy's is a Catholic school, which is dedicated to providing academic excellence in the context of a Christian community ethos. Be it known to all who enter here: Christ is the reason for all we do. He is the invisible presence in every classroom, made visible through our relationships with the pupils and with each other.

Our Catholic education provides our young men with a lens with which to view the world. That lens is the gospel message of Jesus Christ and that every human being has an innate dignity, a glory from within. We seek to form good men with a conscience and desire to develop that 'gloria ab intus', their gifts and talents, so that their excellence may be used at the service of others for the good of the world, a world that is consequentially more beautiful, good and true because of them. Our ethos in every aspect of College life; academic, sporting, artistic and musical, seeks to facilitate the ideal of St Irenaeus that 'the glory of God is the human being fully alive.' Inspired by this ideal, the College, seeks to ensure that all pupils and staff experience opportunities for their own spiritual growth and faith development. In view of this, the following opportunities were provided.

This year saw the formation of a Chaplaincy Team of senior and junior students, aimed largely at encouraging the participation of the boys in the liturgical life of the College, introducing them to the idea of ministry and providing opportunities for charitable work and outreach to the local community. In essence, to give our boys a lived experience of a faith that matters. Some boys actively participated in the daily Morning prayer in the College Chapel and on a Friday at our morning Mass celebrated by Fr Spence, senior students were Ministers of the Word and junior students took the role of Altar Servers. Music was provided each week by Jack Fusco on the College Chapel Organ. Numbers have grown significantly at this Mass and we regularly would have 30/40 students attending as well as staff. A group of seven students were trained and commissioned as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. At our annual St Malachy's Day Mass 27 students were involved in various ministries on the day and really did the College proud with their commitment and preparation.

At the beginning of the academic year each year 8 class had a mini -retreat with Rev Dowd as part of their induction into College life and every form class from years 9-14 were welcomed by Rev Dowd for a session of refamiliarization with the College Chapel after its reopening in May 2023. RE staff were also encouraged to bring their class to the Chapel at least once a term for prayer. Various other year group liturgies were celebrated in the College Chapel. Each year group gathered for both Advent and Passion Services. Once again the senior and junior students of the Chaplaincy team led the services for their peers. It was also a joy to be able to host a Carol Service for staff which was a truly beautiful experience with music provided by the boys.

It was a pleasure to be able to welcome back the Old Boys for the Mass for deceased College staff celebrated by Canon Gunn in November.

Our religious ethos is always evident in the generous way our boys respond to those in need. Two groups of Yr13 students volunteered in Newington Day Centre as part of their Enrichment Programme. They worked with a group of elderly men and women creating scrapbooks of photos of their lives. Our charitable effort at Christmas was an outstanding success. RE staff member, Ms Carla Brennan successfully organised groups of boys and staff in the collection of 670 tonnes of food for the North Belfast Foodbank.

Ms Patricia Morris and Ms Tara Bell were both involved in preparing students to compete in the Ethos Cup. Our annual Lenten Fundraising raised £800 for Trocaire and £500 for the Northern Ireland Hospice. In June Rev Dowd recorded videos which were shared via Parent App to allow the wider College family to participate in the Diocesan Novena to the Sacred Heart.

D. Finance

The Finance and Audit Committee of the Board of Governors has met regularly during the year to fulfil all the legal obligations, and to examine the proposed annual budget for 2024-2025. The College auditors gave a very favourable report on the College's financial and accounting procedures in respect of the 2023/2024 year.

The College operated the following additional accounts in the year ended 31 August 2024:

Pitch Account

The College operates an account for the letting of our 3G pitch. At 31 August 2024 there were fund reserves of £55,282. Reserve Funds accumulated will eventually be used to replace the pitch surface.

Fund-raising Account

The College operates a fund-raising account. Funds raised from the College's designated charities are lodged into this bank account and cheques written to the charities accordingly. Money is also lodged in relation to fundraising activities undertaken by the College, donations from alumni and money raised for school trips.

At 31 March 2024 there was a cash balance of funds of £147,904.

SUMMARY OF CURRICULUM POLICY

The College seeks to develop the potential of every pupil through the provision of a broad, balanced and relevant Curriculum that is in keeping with legislative requirements. The Curriculum on offer is reviewed annually and all measures are taken to ensure its composition reflects the needs of the current cohort of students at each key stage, particularly at GCSE (KS4) and AS/ A2 level (KS5).

Key Stage 3

The College KS3 Curriculum continues to be reviewed within the current cycle of SDP and period of extension. This review has focused on the inclusion of digital skills and uses of digital platforms to enhance learning.

In year 8, all pupils follow the same Curriculum, which includes a total of fifteen subjects as well as discrete provision for Learning for Life and Work (LLW). Elements of LLW are also infused across the learning areas. Across Year 8-10 an Enrichment Programme has been established; this infuses various opportunities which include workshops on pertinent pastoral matters, health and well-being, study skills and a range of sports.

In Years 8 & 9 students are allocated a library period fortnightly during which a focus is placed on reading for enjoyment and enables further promotion of the Accelerated Reader programme which has been well established across KS3.

The teaching development of Digital skills has now been extended and phased into Years 8 and 9, with students have at least one period per week in the newly refurbished Digital Hub. This new innovative curriculum on offer includes basic ICT skills, programming, robotics, cyber security as well as creative digital skills including animation.

Key Stage 4 & 5

At Key Stages 4 & 5 the Curriculum satisfies the Entitlement Framework. This is to ensure that all our pupils have access to a broad range of courses, both general and applied. The College in partnership with other schools from the North Belfast Area Learning Community (NBALC) fulfils the requirement of the Entitlement Framework. (minimum requirement: 21 courses on offer at GCSE and A-Level, at least one third of courses to be applied.)

The College Curriculum is audited annually to ensure the EF requirements are satisfied.

Key Stage 4:

Choice of Subjects for GCSE - All students study 9 or 10 GCSE subjects. Core subjects (studied by all students) include Religious Studies, English Language, English Literature and Mathematics All students also choose <u>five</u> other subjects from the groups below.

GROUP A Science (Pupils must select from the three options)

- Triple Award Science (Biology, Chemistry, Physics)
- Double Award Science (equal to two subject passes incorporating Biology, Chemistry and Physics)
- Single Award Science

GROUP B Languages (all students select at least one language)

- French
- Spanish
- Irish
- Gaeilge

In exceptional circumstances, based on baseline and diagnostic tests, as well as school performance data, a small number of pupils may be exempted from the requirement to study a language at GCSE. This decision must be made after consultation with the Careers Department/ SENCO / Heads of Languages/ Vice Principal Curriculum and Parents.

Pupils of proven ability may be selected for Further Mathematics. These students will complete GCSE Maths in Year 11 and GCSE Further Maths in Year 12.

Key Stage 5:

The Sixth Form Curriculum aims to build upon the foundations laid in KS4.

The College tries to accommodate any combination of subjects. Students normally study three subjects for AS, pupils with a strong GCSE performance (25 points and above) are encouraged to study a fourth subject at GCE AS-level. Most students take three subjects through to A2 level but some who attain top grades at AS may continue to study four.

All pupils are required to supplement their A-level studies by taking additional courses in Religious Education (except for students taking A-level Religious Studies), Tutorial and Careers Education. Students are encouraged to include time for Physical Education (personal fitness training) as well as partaking in a choice of enrichment opportunities.

Examination Results & Leavers Destinations 2023-24

In the summer of 2024, all schools and Colleges returned to public examinations after with no mitigations in place. At the beginning of the academic year the various examination boards outlined how they planned to return to the pre pandemic standards (2019).

In August 2024 the outcome of this examination series was produced. These are documented in Appendix 1 (pages 33-37).

Collaboration with other Schools

In 2023- 2024 KS5 Collaboration continues to take place among the NBALC within Post-16 Provision, with the 11 schools involved having aligned timetable blocks in both Year 13 and 14. This work continues to enable young people from North Belfast to access a wider range of courses and the work has been described as best practice and has been showcased among other ALCs in Belfast.

This collaboration involves partnerships with BRA, Dominican College as well as the two Model Schools for Boys and Girls, Edmund Rice College and Hazelwood Integrated College

SHARED EDUCATION

Shared staff day: All staff had the opportunity to take part in a joint staff day in term one. It was an extremely successful, with staff from both schools being able to choose from a menu of lectures delivered by St Malachys and BRA staff. We were also very fortunate to have a keynote address and workshop on Retrieval from Kate Jones.

Staff training: St. Malachy's staff enthusiastically embraced the online CPD modules on the EA Shared Education hub.

Drama: Bugsy Malone play - this was a huge undertaking between both schools. Especially the Drama and Music departments. The play was a huge success and highlighted the strong collaboration between our two schools.

All involved got a lot out of this experience, increasing confidence in themselves by working on the stage and with students they were not familiar with. Bonds have been created for life!

Music:: For the occasion of the recent 174 Trust anniversary. St. Malachy's College and Belfast Royal Academy marking the start Advent and celebrating 174 Trust's 40th Anniversary. A wonderful event getting everyone into the Christmas Spirit in North Belfast.

History: Thirty of our Year 11 History students accompanied by Mr McStravick and Miss McVeigh were fortunate to be invited to a shared education event at Belfast Royal Academy. This event was part of Holocaust Memorial Day which takes place each year on 27th January. The Holocaust Education Charity Generation2Generation delivered an insightful and engaging presentation on the Holocaust using survivor testimony, artefacts and multimedia tools. This morning's session was led by Diana Cook who retold her mother' Margot Pogorzelski's experience of The Holocaust. Margot's story was presented by her daughter using family photos and voiced extracts from a brief memoir Margot wrote describing her childhood and early adult life. By telling her family story Diana looked at how collective sympathy for the plight of refugees can turn to fear and prejudice in no time at all. This presentation was particularly resonant for the year 11 pupils who have just finished studying the escalation of racial persecution in Nazi Germany from 1939-1945 as part of their GCSE History course.

Politics: Seven students attended a Politics in Action group, alongside BRA and Fortwilliam. They produced a project which addresses some aspect of local politics which they feel should be improved and produce a final report which they presented to local MLAs and journalists at Stormont. There were five sessions this year which are held in the various schools and then the final presentation at Stormont. MLAs, MPs and local journalists/media personalities also attend the sessions and the students had the opportunity to tell them about their project and to ask them questions about the current political situation/events. They delivered their final project on Thursday 29th February at Stormont. I have attached their final project.

English: On Wednesday 28th February our Year 13 English students, along with BRA, visited Seamus Heaney's Homeplace. This was a great opportunity for both schools to find out more about Heaney's life and influence. They even had the opportunity to attend a lecture hosted by a professor of English at Queen's University Belfast. This provided valuable insight into the poets the students are studying at AS Level. They had a great time and we wish them every success in their upcoming AS Level examinations!

Y8 students attended the launch of the NBALC 2023/24 Poetry Anthology at RBAI. This year, students were asked to compose poems on the theme of 'Identity'. Four students from 8E had their poems selected and were invited to read their poems aloud to an audience that included: the Belfast Lord Mayor, Ryan

Murphy and representatives from the John Hewitt Society and the Ulster University. A special thanks go to Ms Herron from Belfast Royal Academy for curating and editing this year's beautiful anthology.

LLW - Once upon a time in Northern Ireland: The BBC and the Northern Ireland Education Authority yesterday hosted a special screening of the multi-award-winning documentary, *Once Upon a Time in Northern Ireland.* Screened at the Queen's Film Theatre Belfast, 180 teenagers from ten schools (including St Malachys College, and BRA) were invited to attend the event, alongside teachers and school leaders. Pupils from our Year 12 GCSE Learning for Life and Work classes attended the screening and contributed to the Q&A session at the end.

The event was hosted as part of an EA Shared Education pilot to explore how the acclaimed documentary series might be used as a resource in schools, to help the next generation to better understand Northern Ireland's past.

Geography/Science: BRA were not able to commit to the cooperation Ireland schools for climate change project this year, we have linked in with Boys Model.

We have 6 Y13 students participating in this programme; as well as 6 Y13 pupils from Boys Model. Unfortunately, the trip to Galway was cancelled last minute by cooperation Ireland. The boys really benefitted from this project and have UCAS points to show for it.

Building on the themes of last year, in this programme, we will be supporting our pilot schools to deliver EcoEd4All science courses between October and January 2024. Each course takes approximately 90 minutes to complete and is provided by our Programme Partner, Alison: the Free Empowerment Platform. Upon completion of the online courses, schools and pupils will begin climate-related social action projects, alongside cross-border partner schools.

SPECIAL NEEDS PROVISION

The Special Educational Needs Provision in St. Malachy's College ensures that the needs of all students with specific, individual learning, and medical needs are supported within an inclusive and socially integrated learning environment.

The College's policy and procedures on Special Educational Needs (SEN) follow the Department of Education's Code of Practice on the identification and assessment of SEN.

Our Learning Support Co-Ordinator, Mr Aaron Douglas, leads the team, and is responsible for the identification, assessment and coordination of the arrangements and facilities for students with short and long-term SEN.

In the academic year 2023-2024, there were 142 (12.1%) students on the SEN Register and 335 (28.5%) on the Medical Register. This included 48 (4.1%) students with a Stage 3 Statement of SEN. In addition, 159 (13.5%) students received Examination Access Arrangements in the College.

All students on the SEN register have an Individual Education Plan and are currently in receipt of support which is tailored to each student's specific needs within the classroom. The College buildings are fully compliant with disability legislation. College staff work in consultation with parents and outside agencies to make appropriate arrangements for students and visitors with disabilities.

Over the last year learning support and teaching staff have accessed a range of professional development courses provided by the Education Authority and external providers. Areas addressed included: AAIS Emotional Regulation based on the principles of Zones of Regulation; Level 1 & 2 Autism Awareness & Intervention Strategies; Supporting Young People with ADHD in a Post Primary Classroom; Access Arrangements for Post Primary Pupils with Literacy Difficulties; and Dyslexia Friendly Post Primary Classroom.

K. Arrangements for School security

(c.f. The Education (NI) Order 1998 – Article 15)

The Board of Governors of St Malachy's College is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for staff and visitors in the College.

Access

Entrance to the College property for students is normally only by the Antrim Road gate. The Lincoln Avenue and Crumlin Road gates are open only for limited periods at the beginning and end of the school day to facilitate staff parking.

Visitors

Parents and visitors are welcome to the College. However, all visitors must report to the College Office. If they are proceeding beyond the office, they will be issued with a visitor's pass for the duration of their stay on College premises.

Meetings between visitors and staff will normally take place by appointment. Visitors and parents are not permitted to approach staff directly in their classrooms.

Cars

In the interest of safety and to avoid congestion, parents are asked not to bring cars on to the school premises at the beginning or end of the school day. Only staff or visitors that have signed in, are permitted to park on the College site.

General security

The College monitors every visitor to the College and utilises a range of security measures including intruder alarms, CCTV coverage and security lighting. The College employs caretakers / security guards to monitor the Lincoln Avenue entrance from the end of the school day to late evening while our sports facilities are used by external groups. These measures assist in providing a safe secure environment for pupils, staff and visitors.

CAREERS EDUCATION, INFORMATION, ADVICE AND GUIDANCE 2023/24

The Careers Department works in partnership with two Careers Advisers from the Department of Employment and Learning (DEL) to provide CEIAG at the College.

All students in Y10 – Y14 are scheduled one lesson of Employability/Careers Education per two weeks. Methodology is varied according to year group and topic, and includes teacher and PowerPoint presentations, videos, class and peer group discussions, individual research and reflection, and a range of topic workbooks.

At Key Stage 3, the CCEA Education for Employability programme, with its emphasis on pupil-centred learning and preparing young people for life after school, influences the careers programme. In addition to Careers lessons, some Key Stage 4 students also study CCEA GCSE Learning for Life and Work, of which Employability is a major component. In the Sixth Form, the emphasis is on preparing students for university, higher level apprenticeships, and accessing experiential learning in preparation for the world of work. Pupils are encouraged to apply for and participate in virtual and in-person work experiences and provided with all application details in class and through the Google Classroom platform.

Careers staff, supported by academic staff, advise on all aspects of subject choice, and guidance was provided to class groups and individuals as required. C Johnston and L Graham presented to parents of Year 10 and 12 students to provide age-specific subject choice guidance. GCSE and AS/A Level Options Booklets were produced to support students in making their subject choices and to inform parents about the curricular offer. GCSE and AS/A Level Options Events were held during the second term. Careers staff were available for consultation by pupils and parents post examination results in August to advise students who were required to make alternative subject choices for AS-Level.

All Year 12 pupils had a Career Guidance Interview with one of the DEL Careers Advisers, either face-toface, on-line or by phone. Career guidance interviews were offered to all pupils in Years 10, 13 and 14 and were arranged as required throughout the year. Since the pandemic NICS have conducted these interviews via telephone, which has enabled more speedy and efficient progress through the years groups, enhancing the number of interviews we can complete. From Year 10 onwards, pupils are expected to produce a realistic Personal Career Plan.

All Year 13 students were offered the chance to participate in the Work Experience programme. A large number of students took part and gained vital skills and experience in the industry of their choice. Staff visited all student who took part and ensured successful completion of placements. Feedback from students and employers was highly positive.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

St Malachy's College has an unrivalled reputation for excellence across a wide range of sports. The College is widely recognised for excellence in the delivery of curricular Physical Education and provision of a varied extracurricular sports programme.

The floodlit 3G pitch is a terrific facility that benefits both the pupils and the local community. The College makes full use of the pitch for curricular and extra-curricular activities up to 5.30pm Monday to Friday and manages the community use from 6.00pm to 10.00pm during the week and at weekends. The pitch is used for PE classes, extracurricular sport, outside clubs and for students before school, at break time and lunch time. Due to the very heavy usage, the quality of the playing surface diminished significantly, and we were delighted that the pitch was refurbished. The PE Department appreciates the financial pressures currently being placed on school budgets but again welcomes the positive comments from our College Principal with regards to the potential for extending and refurbishing the staff area.

Usage of the Fitness Suite by both staff and students continues to increase. The Key Stage 4 PE students have benefited from an overhaul of the programme to make it more specific to their level of performance. The Fitness Suite is of great benefit when assisting in the physical preparation of the various school sports teams. Many players who are involved in College teams use the Fitness Suite before, during and after school. Key Stage 5 students have access to the Fitness Suite for four periods during the week as a break from their studies and to maintain and develop their personal fitness levels. In addition to weight resistance machines, cardiovascular fitness machines and free weights, the department has added Swiss exercise balls, resistance bands, skipping ropes, a punch bag, dip bars and chin up bars to enhance the experience. Again, the refurbishment which was completed in the last couple of years has made a tremendous difference to the positive experience of the users.

Regarding examination PE in the 2023-24 academic year, there were two Year 11 and two Year 12 class studying GCSE Physical Education (CCEA) with healthy numbers in each.. After school booster classes, at GCSE, AS and A2, help those boys who are under performing or having difficulty with specific topics. The department staff and the boys have benefitted greatly from the introduction and delivery of the BTEC in Sport at KS5. This has provided another academic pathway for our boys.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES AND STAFF

The College curricular and extra-curricular programme endeavours to promote a healthy and active lifestyle and lay the foundation for further development of interest in sport after school and in the community.

The well managed programme makes a significant contribution to the physical, social, mental and moral education of our pupils and should:

- Contribute to the health and well-being of pupils
- Help develop pupils' self esteem
- Extend the benefits of PE lessons
- Offer opportunities for competitive challenges and representative honours
- Contribute to the development of excellence

Tribute must be paid to all staff for their commitment in giving of their own time for our extra-curricular sports programme. The College offers a wide and extensive range of activities at a variety of age groups, by providing equal opportunity and encouraging high participation rates. Our extra-curricular sports programme is successful

because of the commitment of our pupils, dedication and professionalism of the staff, the continuing support of parents, the senior management and our Principal, Mr. McBride.

In addition to teaching staff, the College is forever grateful to many past pupils and parents who also assist with sport development in the College and who, as proud Malachians want to maintain the rich sporting reputation of the College throughout Ireland and beyond. Mr Danny Fulton has assisted greatly in the development of our Basketball and Golf teams. Martin Sherlock has been a tremendous advocate and mentor for the department. They have all given of their time, energy and expertise. The PE staff and the boys are very grateful of this invaluable help and support.

Mr. Molloy, as Teacher in charge of Basketball and Soccer continues to do an outstanding job in co-ordinating the coaching of various teams throughout the school. This includes working closely with staff to ensure all our teams get an appropriate pitch allocation for training, that all games are played on time with a minimum of disruption and crucially that we ensure the boys who are out of class to represent the College are up to date with their academic work. Mr. McAlister continues with the responsibility of Teacher in charge of Athletics and Cross Country and the boys have been hugely successful again this year. Mr Michael Cooke also continues to work closely with our athletes and has been a huge part of their success. Mr McClean, as Teacher in charge of Gaelic Games, is co-ordinating the development of our Gaelic Football and Hurling teams. A focus for him has been the earlier introduction of after school Gaelic Football sessions from September rather than waiting until after Christmas.

The Martin McMullan Memorial Race

The Martin McMullan Race for Year 8 pupils is one of the great College traditions in our athletics programme. This year, due to an extended period of very poor weather, the decision was taken to roll back the years and host the race on the College site. In addition, we used a loop around the Girdwood Hub. It was another very enjoyable event, and a huge credit must go to all the boys who competed on the day. It was a highly competitive event as always with Lucas Mooney holding off a surging Micheál Conlon to take top spot on the podium, with James Rafferty in 3rd place. The presentation was held the following week in the College Hall. The Top 30 individual finishers are listed below along with the team event.

Athletics

District Cross Country

The Year 8s set the tone for the day with a narrow victory over Methody to finish first out of 13 teams. After a relatively poor start Thomas Coy charged through the 85 man field to get up to second place with a few hundred metres to run, only to lose a couple of places in a very close sprint finish. Patrick Hume and Cormac Leheny ran

fine races to finish in 6th and 7th. Peadar Sheridan rounded out the scoring quartet in 18th place to secure the first team title on offer.

Tiernan Conway and Cillian McMullan were always to the fore in the Minor boys (Year 9) race with Tiernan a clear second and Cillian just pipped for the bronze medal on the line. Sé Sweetnam finished in 9th and Aidan O'Hara (13th) won his battle with Ethan Connolly (15th) to complete the scoring.

The Junior boys placed all their scorers in the top seven to secure the third title of the days in excellent fashion. Ben Neal ran in the top three throughout the race and was rewarded with the individual bronze medal. A trio of the recent victorious Gaelic team filled 5th to 7th places with Darragh Rooney, Daire Donnelly and Cathair McKenna finishing in that order. Darragh was unlucky as a slight wrong turn towards the end cost him 4th place, whereas Daire and Cathair had strong finishes to pick up several places in the run in.

Finn Diver led the Inter boys race from start to finish and looked comfortable in doing so. He was superbly backed up by a pair of year 11s who still have another year in this age group. Jude McGann picked up the individual bronze and was closely followed by Eoin McConnell in 4th. Donal Owens finished up their scoring with a strong 7th place. The senior boys packed well finishing five runners in a row from 5th to 9th place to complete the sweep of all the boys' titles on offer. Odhran Rafferty was the first green vest across the line, closely followed by Ronan McAree, Diarmuid Hanna, Adam McCann and Evan Stanley. All these teams went on to compete for Ulster titles and All-Ireland qualifying berths.

2023 Ulster Schools Cross Country

Super seniors save their best for last.

St Malachy's Senior Boys claimed the Ulster title in fine fashion with an excellent team display at the Ulster Schools Championships at Mallusk in February. A group of Year 14 students produced the goods in their last outing in a provincial Championships in College colours. Evan Stanley ran the best race of his life to claim 5th place, Diarmuid Hanna showed his class in 8th with Ronan McAree close behind him in 9th. Odhran Rafferty rounded out the scoring quartet in 11th place to give St Malachy's a convincing victory with 33 points, well ahead of St Michael's Enniskillen (80 points) and St Colman's Newry (108 points). Adam McCann ran strongly to back them up in 20th place. The Intermediate Boys ran strongly to claim the team silver behind a very good St Michael's squad that will be firm favourites for the All-Ireland title. Such are the high standards that Finn Diver sets himself that he will be disappointed with his individual 4th place finish. Year 11 pupils Eoin McConnell and Jude McGann ran well in 17th and 24th respectively, Donal Owens completed the scoring in 38th place. Both the Junior (Year 10) and Minor (Year 9) teams finished in fourth place and were unlucky to narrowly miss out on a place at the All-Irelands. Tiernan Conway ran a fantastic race to lead the Minors in 7th place and claim an individual qualifying place for the All-Irelands. Top finisher for the Junior boys' team was Ben Neal in 30th with Cathair McKenna close behind in 35th. The Mini Boys team gained great experience, finishing in fifth place at their first Ulster Championships. Thomas Coy got a much better start and ran a superb race to finish in 9th place. At the Irish school's Cross-Country Championships Finn Diver claimed a fantastic individual bronze medal in horrible conditions in Waterford. 2023 Ulster Schools Track & Field Championships

On a fine Saturday at Antrim Forum Finn Diver (Year 12) led every step of the way in the Inter Boys 1500m to claim a convincing victory. It was a sweet win for Finn as he had also led the first 2900m of the 3000m on Friday evening, before being passed for the gold in the closing stages. He was rewarded for his front running in the 3000m with a personal best and sub nine min clocking. There were no such troubles in the 1500m as he pulled away on the last lap for a strong win. He qualified for the All-Ireland Championships in both events. Finn Diver was presented his gold medal for the 1500m by Gerry Carson, President of Athletics NI and a past pupil of the College.

Ciaran Lopes (Year 10) claimed an excellent, if unexpected triumph in the Junior Boys Long Jump. Having finished 3rd in the Districts a couple of weeks previous, Ciaran added a massive 32 cm to his personal best to jump 5.38 m for gold. This was a fantastic achievement in only his second ever official competition. Ciaran needed every bit of the extra distance with the top five in the event only separated by 15cm. Ben Neal (Year 10) was the next best of the College athletes. He ran a brave race in the Junior Boys 800m, leading through the first lap. The first two passed him early on the second lap, but the third placer only caught him with 100m to go and they fought a great battle down the home straight, with Ben losing out on the bronze medal and an All-Ireland berth by a mere two tenths of

a second. Year 8 pupils Cormac Leheny and Thomas Coy gained valuable experience in the 800m in their first visit to the Ulster Schools Championships.

Jude McGann (Year 11) ran a pair of strong races, against athletes mostly a year older, in the Inter boys 800m and 1500m. In the 800m he equalled his personal best and then only one hour later came back to finish sixth behind Finn in the 1500m in a new personal best time.

On Friday evening Ronan McAree (Year 14) earned his highest finish in a provincial championship in 5th place. After a slow start to the race the top four pulled away and Ronan found himself in a race for 5th. He bided his time and struck on the last lap to finish his last race for the College in style. In the 3000m Eoin McConnell (Yr11) ran a big personal best of 9.50 to finish in the top 10, his first time under 10 minutes for the distance.

At the Irish Schools Track and Field Championships in Tullamore Finn Diver ran a brilliantly executed race to pick up a fantastic silver medal. With the leader heading off at record pace, Finn settled into the chase group and conserved his energy for a big effort on the final lap. His plan worked and he pulled away from the chasers over the final 200m to secure the silver.

Basketball

Year 8 Basketball

Every April, as part of the preparations for the Year 8 Vince Halloran Tournament, our basketballers make the short trip across the city to Our Lady and St Patrick's College Knock.

Having practiced throughout the year, this day is all about exposing the boys to playing competitive games against different opposition. It is always an enjoyable experience for every player with learning in a fun environment the focus. The boys went on to play in the Vince Halloran Tournament in Lisburn Racquets. The 2023 games against OLSPCK, Rathmore and St Pat's Armagh were all very competitive, but the boys dug really deep in the final to come away with the win.

U14 All Ireland Semi Finalists 2023

The U14 squad was drawn in a four-team tournament in Malahide Community School. The winners would advance to the semi-finals of the U14A Schools Cup. Standing in our way were the hosts, alongside Our Lady's Castleblayney and St Pat's Cavan. It was a straight shoot out, winners go through, no backdoors. An excellent all-round display from the team, with outstanding contributions from Layden O'Neill and Tiernan Conway helped the College to three victories on the day. Jude O'Carroll showed his shooting touch along with young Year 8 talent, Oliver Donnelly. Eamon Loye, Ethan Carr and Connor Lundy helped to dominate the boards while Fionn Marley, Joe Devlin, Adam Savage and Eamon Tohill worked tirelessly at the defensive end and out on the fastbreak.

League Year 10 Regional Report

Regional 'A' Winners and All Ireland Finalists 2023

The All-Ireland Schools League competition for our U15 boys tipped off in September 2022. This competition starts on a regional basis, with the top 16 teams in Ireland advancing to the knockout stages of the All-Ireland League Playoffs. These games were played on a home OR away basis against seven other teams in the North-East Region. The team went undefeated against St Mary's Drogheda, St Joseph's Drogheda and Rathmore. A victory on a score line of 47 - 35 over Our Lady's Castleblayney in the semi-final resulted in a trip to the Phoenix Centre, Carrickmacross for a matchup against St Pat's Cavan. The team dug in defensively to win a close contest and become North East Regional Champions on a score line of 44-30. Two further impressive wins including one over Colaiste Iognaid, Galway saw the team advance to the All-Ireland semi-finals to cap off another fine season.

The boys won a thrilling encounter against Mercy Mounthawk, Tralee by the narrowest of margins, 41- 40. What a game! Unfortunately, the boys just came out on the wrong end of another tight affair against Rathmore, Co Kerry in the All-Ireland Final.

U16 Regional Winners and All Ireland Schools Semi Finalists

Drawn in the first round of the All-Ireland Schools Cup against a highly fancied Colaiste Eanna team from Dublin, the U16 team put up a very spirited display and were leading going into the last quarter in the College Sports Hall. Unfortunately, an extended run of possessions without scoring in the final quarter saw the boys come up just short of advancing to the second round, so all efforts would have to be focused on the All-Ireland Schools League competition. The U16 team had a very successful campaign coming through the combined North and North East region undefeated. These victories included wins over St Mary's, Drogheda, St Joseph's Drogheda and Rathmore. The final was a low scoring battle, the final score-line of 24-22 saying it all! In the U16 basketball Round of 16, the team again rose to the challenge of a visiting team, in this case, Belvedere College from Dublin. This victory took the boys to the quarter final stages of the All-Ireland Schools League which was a terrific achievement.

The U19 team had a very successful campaign coming through the combined North and North East region undefeated. These victories included wins over St Mary's, Drogheda, St Joseph's Drogheda and Rathmore. The team had standout performances from Luke and Michael Donnelly as well as Jake McCotter, but it was certainly an all-around team effort.

After beating Dunshaughlin Community School., Co. Meath on a score-line of 65-42. the regional final was a much tighter affair. The final was an excellent contest between the College and St. Pat's Cavan in The Phoenix Centre, Carrickmacross, Co. Monaghan. Michael Donnelly was at the forefront of the second half revival with four big three-pointers to lead the team to a 65-58 victory. The team then progressed through the round of 16 with a superb victory over Presentation College, Bray. The quarter final was played in the Oblate Hall in Inchicore. In another super team performance, the boys dug out a hard-fought win against Knockbeg College, Carlow on a scoreline of 58-52. Unfortunately, we met our match in the semi-final, losing in the National Basketball Arena to Colaiste Eanna, Dublin the eventual winners.

U16 and U19 North East Regional Champions 2023-24

The Under 16 basketball team beat St Patrick's College Cavan in an exciting regional final in the Phoenix Centre Carrickmacross in November 2023. The Under 19 basketball team beat Templeogue College Dublin in a pulsating All-Ireland quarter final in the College Sports Hall to set up a semi-final clash against Malahide Community School.

The Brian Molloy Memorial Tournament

In June 2024, current and former College basketball players once again graced the Sports Hall to remember former pupil, Head of PE and basketball coach Brian Molloy. In all honesty, this is a tournament that we should host every year but only manage to do so on an occasional basis.

On this occasion, as well as competitive games and friendly banter, the old boys were contributing financially to the U16 basketball players tour to America in October 2024. We want to thank all those who participated in the tournament and helped to make the day a huge success and very enjoyable.

Football Roundup

In the reset edition of The Collegian, we highlighted the several highly notable performances over the last number of years as well as some photos of the many boys involved from Year 8 all the way through to Year 14.

The dynamic has changed with so many of our older boys training several nights a week. Therefore, Year 8 -Year 11 teams have a regular training slot one day a week and the older boys, Year 12 - 14 play competitive matches for the College, but don't have an allocated training day. This model works very well. Key Stage 3 students, regardless of ability, are all welcome to training sessions and turn out on a weekly basis.

As Year 10 squads, both the current Year 11, and current Year 12 groups, had terrific seasons. They won both the Belfast Cup and Northern Ireland Cup. Winning one competition is extremely difficult but to win two is very unusual and a tremendous achievement. To repeat this achievement in successive years is out of this world!

The Year 12 group beat St Mary's CBGS 1-0 in the final at the Welders, Ciaran Boyle getting the only goal in a close encounter. In the Northern Ireland Cup, held at the Coleraine Showgrounds, the game finished 2-2 and went to extra time and penalties. The penalty shootout was dramatic, as first the advantage swung towards St Columb's, Derry, and then back towards St Malachy's. Rory Finney, our goalkeeper, made two terrific saves to help turn the tie in our favour.

The current Year 11 squad repeated the feat in 2023. In the Belfast Cup Final, the team beat Boys Model 3-0, with Cian Shivers, Michael Jennings and Sean Cassidy getting on the scoresheet. In the Northern Ireland Cup, the boys had a terrific 2-0 win over Lurgan Junior High with once again Cian Shivers hitting the back of the net alongside Cathair McKenna.

The Success of Year 8 Football

Mr McStravick of the History Department has led the Year 8 football squads for many years. Once the season starts, upwards of 80 boys flock to his training sessions on a weekly basis.

Over the years, Mr McStravick has been ably supported by members and former members of staff. Even though his teams have won several Belfast and Northern Ireland cups, the real value of the Year 8 football experience is in the friendships that form and flourish ever year.

St Malachy's lift Translink Cup for the first time 2023

The Translink Schools' Gold Cup involves the eight post-primary schools who have been awarded the Gold Schools Quality Mark accreditation by the Irish FA Foundation.

The Schools Quality Mark accreditation supports schools to put structures in place to develop football. This competition involves schools playing each other across three age groups (U13, U15, U17).

Schools are ranked by their performances over all age groups with one school winning the Translink Gold Cup and claiming 'Top Football Performance School' status in Northern Ireland.

For the first time, St Malachy's lifted the Translink Cup in 2023.

A Vibrant Gaelic Games Scene at the College

Gaelic games are vibrant in the College, and very much part of the fabric of its daily sporting life. Since our last publication, a great deal of work has been done by members of the teaching and support staff into nurturing and developing the skills of our boys.

We have had great support at Board of Governor level as well as past pupils who are keen to invest in the promotion of Gaelic games. So much excellent coaching and skill development are already happening in lots of clubs. It is terrific to see our boys who compete against each other in a club setting, standing shoulder to shoulder and building lifelong friendships in St Malachy's gear. We have included some of the recent successes in this part of the Sports section, including Gaelic Football, Hurling and Handball.

Our boys bring back Ulster Schools McGourty Cup 25 May 2023

This spirited group of young men fought through a very tough semi-final against St Patrick's Keady, a side that equally matched our skill and determination during an exciting and nerve wrecking game which resulted in extra time. Here, the boys showed a greater determination and hunger and eventually edged ahead in the last few minutes of extra time. The boys went on to a convincing win against St Colman's Newry where the hurling they put on display was a credit to the College and testament to their hard work and determination. The boys brought back the Ulster Schools McGourty Cup!

History makers lift McGreevy Cup for the first time

This fantastic group of young men capitalised on successes in previous years to win the McGreevy Cup for the first time in the College's history. They held off a super second half fight back from St Patrick's Armagh, the defending champions, at the Eoghan Ruadh pitch in Dungannon. Se Whittaker and Brendan Herdman gave brilliant performances in midfield, as did Addison Morris at half back and free taker Aidan Johnston. They led by four points to no score coming up to half-time, but Armagh sprang into life with a goal from their top player Josh Lucas, making for an exciting second half. The key moment was Codhran O'Rourke's goal that gave us the ability to hold on to clinch a first for the College.

European Junior Handball Championships in Friesland, Netherlands

Shea Bell, Darragh McIlroy, Ryan Garcia and Declan McGinley travelled as part of the County squad with coach and past pupil Dan McVicker, alongside former three-time World Champion Fiona Shannon. Darragh was narrowly beaten in the final of the boys 15&U singles in a fantastic match.

Shea and Darragh were desperately unlucky to lose the final by a singlepoint in a very tense final against the European number ones. Both lads cemented their status as the of the best U15 players in Europe. Also competing, Declan McGinley and Ryan Garcia competed in the fiercely competitive 17&U and 19&U Categories. Both played fantastic handball to reach the quarter-finals.

Swimming

Year 10 pupil Aidan O'Hara had his first taste of international swimming on a recent trip to Copenhagen for the Lyngby Invitational Open Gala. The up-and-coming swimming star swam his heats in the 25m pool, managing PBs in his 25m, 50m, and 100m free, along with further PBs in his 50m and 100m back stroke.

Amazingly, Aidan qualified for the finals in his 100m free and 50m back stroke in a very tough 14-15 year old age group – he is the youngest in that group, only turning 14 in February.

The finals were nerve-wrecking for his dad standing watching beside the 50m pool as the lights were dimmed. Pumping music and individual introductions for each competitor added to the atmosphere. All the races were streamed live on YouTube.

Aidan swam two fantastic swims in the finals achieving a second place in the 100m free, and third place in the 50m back stroke, topping off the podiums with two second places and two third places overall for the gala. After a memorable trip and an amazing experience Aidan is now attempting to achieve qualifying times for the Irish Nationals, being held in Limerick in July.

He heads to the Swim Ulster Long Course Gala Bangor Arena, and the Ulster Senior Schools Gala where he will compete on behalf of St Malachy's.

Aidan qualified and competed in his first Swim Ulster Short Course Open Championships last November. This is an extremely competitive competition and to even qualify is an achievement especially being only 13.

Aidan was the only male swimmer from his club Alliance who qualified, as times are so difficult to achieve. He swam his 200m back stroke finishing in the top 20, meaning qualification to the finals. In the finals he achieved a personal best swim and finished 14th an overall – remarkable considering the age range of the swimmers in the final was 1

Pupil Music News from 2023-2024

In April 2023, **Jack Fusco Year 13** (harpsichord) was awarded a place in the Irish Youth Baroque Orchestra. This orchestra is comprised of young Irish musicians aged 18–24 who study at conservatoires across Europe. At 16, Jack was the youngest in the group. They performed in the National Concert Hall and St Anne's in Dublin. Congratulations, Jack!

In August 2023, **Senan Sheridan Year 12** (piano) was invited by acclaimed Northern Irish pianist Michael McHale to perform Gershwin's Concerto in F during rehearsals with the Ulster Youth Orchestra, for their 30th anniversary concerts. Senan rehearsed and performed for two days under the watchful eye of renowned Venezuelan-American conductor, Ilyich Rivas. Fantastic, Senan! He also recently performed Mozart's Concerto No. 10 for Two Pianos, K. 365, first movement (March 2023) alongside Jack Fusco and the College Orchestra, as well as the abridged version of Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2 with CBSM's ICE ensemble in August 2023.

Since entering his first local music festival in 2022, Senan has won numerous awards, including Most Promising Pianist and the Musician of the Year at the Portadown Music Festival in both 2022 and 2023, the Most Memorable Performance of Contemporary Music and the Most Promising Pianist of Secondary School Age at the Irish Youth Piano Festival, 2022. He was also awarded the Best Junior Young Musician (Under 16) at the Northern Ireland Young Musician of the Year, 2022.

More recently, he was awarded 2nd place in the Junior Concerto class of Feis Ceoil, 2023 as well as 1st place in the Open Sonata class and an award for the competitor with the highest mark (94) across graded piano classes at the Holywood Festival of Music, 2023. Senan is also founder and leader of a piano quintet that was awarded the highest mark (95) across all instrumental classes in this year's festival. Senan previously studied piano with Ruth McGinley, and Professor Réamonn Keary at the Royal Irish Academy of Music, Dublin.

Jude Scott Year 14 (Irish flute) performed in Belfast Tradfest in July 2023. Also in July, Jude was awarded third place in the Ulster Fleadh. In October 2023, Jude was part of the warm-up act for Flook, a world famous Irish traditional band, who played the Duncairn in October 2023. Jude and Ronan McLaughlin Yr9 (fiddle) are both playing with The Fureys in January 2024 as part of their Waterfront show.

Connor Rogers Year 12 performed in Les Misérables with BSPA during Summer 2023. He is also currently a member of the group Adoro.

Eoin Brown Year 14, Liam Alexander Year 13, Finn Harding Year 13 and Connor Rogers Year 12, all performed with National Youth Choir Northern Ireland in July 2023.

Finn Harding Year 13 performed in Bernstein's Westside Story with the James Huish Academy, in Avenue Arts Centre, Belfast at the end of August 2023.

Caolan Fitzsimons Year 13 currently has a lead role (Hans) in Frozen - The Musical, with NISMAT. Caolan's band, AOA, have also been busy outside of school performing at a Pure Mental charity event, and in several other venues around the city.

CONCLUSION

2023/24 has been another highly successful year for the College. Under guidance from DE, the College produced a 3-year School Development Plan, which builds on the previous plans, sets challenges and creates opportunities across key areas. Departments focused on routines within the classroom setting, combining raising Standards through High Quality Teaching & Learning with a focus on maintaining outstanding pastoral care. The College mission statement and motto, "Gloria ab intus" underpins the SDP encouraging each student to strive for his unique glory from within. The newly formed Chaplaincy Team of senior and junior students made a strong contribution to faith development and the refurbished College chapel enhanced the services and celebrations of faith throughout the year.

Curriculum highlights included the introduction of an extra-curricular GSCE opportunity for students wishing take an 11th subject outside of the timetable and our strong links with the NBALC continued. 2023-24 was the second year of our three-year Digital Hub pilot which has focused on the development and delivery of a new and relevant Key Stage 3 digital curriculum. This has been highly successful with students embracing workspace skills, producing digital portfolios and becoming skilled in aspects of programming and animation, learning about cyber security and developing digital media projects. We have already invested in 7 staff and 360 learners. Through the Digital Hub, the College is progressing a visionary and innovative digital curriculum that is skilling our learners for third level education and future careers. Schools across The North Belfast Area Learning Community (NBALC) regularly attend timetabled classes in the Digital Hub.

The Pastoral teams continued to develop an age-appropriate preventative curriculum with the introduction of accredited modules in the Key Stage 4 pastoral curriculum. A new Pupil Attendance Policy was ratified and pupil attendance in post Covid society was a central focus.

Enhancing opportunities for capacity building and leadership at all levels was enhanced by the establishment of a Leadership Development Programme within the College to allow middle leaders the opportunity to participate in whole school strategic planning. 11 staff applied for the programme and focused on areas including attendance, target setting and service leadership. These staff presented to others as part of the College's dynamic and strategic Continuing Professional Development. Leadership among the student body was strengthened by the Student Council who led in the development of an eco-friendly uniform exchange scheme and other environmental initiatives.

Partnership with our Parents/Carers is at the core of our success at St. Malachy's. 2023/24 saw the re- introduction of the College annual Gala dinner organised by The Friends of St Malachy's Parent Association. Proceeds from the association's fundraising activities being targeted to directly support and enrich our pupils' curricular and extracurricular experiences.

In terms of sporting achievements, it was a highly successful year for the College. St Malachy's Senior Boys claimed the Ulster 2023 Schools Cross Country title and in basketball, the U16 and U19 teams were North East Regional Champions 2023-24. Soccer successes included terrific seasons for both the current Year 11, and current Year 12 groups, who lifted the Belfast Cup and Northern Ireland Cup. For the first time, St Malachy's lifted the Translink Cup in 2023, thus claiming 'Top Football Performance School' status in Northern Ireland. There were notable successes in Gaelic football with Year 8 winning the Ulster Schools McGourty Cup.
