St Malachy's College is a very special place with a rich history and since its foundation, pupils from St Malachy's have played a vibrant and active part in events which shaped the history of these islands.

The mission statement of St Malachy's College charges us with the responsibility of preserving our traditions of spirituality and learning. Nowhere is this more evident than in the College Sixth Form where young minds are challenged and stimulated to be the very best they can be in living out the College motto "Gloria ab Intus".

Your two years in the Sixth Form will be one of the most important periods in your academic career; a time when your experiences and achievements will shape your future. But, Sixth Form life transcends the classroom, as you will be provided with the opportunity to engage socially, and develop your leadership, resilience and aspirations.

We offer a range of courses for pupils wishing to study at university, pursue Higher Level Apprenticeships and for those who may be seeking employment. Pupils have the opportunity to study 3 or 4 A Levels (or equivalents) from an extensive offer of vocational and academic subjects. Whatever your interest or aspirations, there is something for you at the College, from BTEC qualifications in Sport

and IT Technicals to more traditional subjects such as A Levels in Chemistry, Maths and History.

Recognising the importance of decisions that are made in Sixth Form, we have a comprehensive Careers programme that supports our pupils. This includes work experience placements, access to online courses, preparation for aptitude tests, visits from universities representatives and businesses, as well as detailed, personalised and comprehensive guidance on third-level education and the UCAS process. From personal statement writing, to course choices and interview preparations, the College supports pupils to achieve their aspirations.

Our Pastoral team is led by the Head of School, a Head of Year 14 and a Head of Year 13 who in turn lead a team of Form Teachers who manage the day-to-day pastoral needs of the pupils. In the most recent, full ETI Inspection, pastoral care in the College was deemed to be "outstanding". Year 13 pupils have the opportunity to participate in an Enrichment programme including a number of accredited qualifications such as OCN in Journalism, IFA Coaching Awards or First Aid. Pupils can enhance their Digital Skills through our innovative Digital Hub or participate in a plethora of extra-curricular opportunities including singing in the senior choir, cross country running, debating or leading the Green Team. Our Year 14 pupils develop as leaders in the Senior Prefect and Prefect Teams but, also through charitable contributions

such as the SVP Christmas Hamper Appeal or volunteering in the local community painting the windows of the hospice at Christmas time. There is quite simply something for everyone.

Head Boy View:

“What does it mean to be a Malachian?”

St. Malachy's, from its inception, has had a core role in the community that surrounds it. Through The Troubles, which greatly impacted North Belfast; the COVID-19 pandemic; and more, the school has provided a refuge for staff, students, and families. The school also gives back to the community through its frequent collaboration with St Vincent de Paul. Moreover, there is a strong emphasis on collaboration between other schools in the community, shown by the College's involvement in the North Belfast Area Learning Community.

As we mark the 190th year of the College's existence, it's remarkable to think that the school began with only 8 boarders and 10 day pupils. Now home to over 1000 students, St. Malachy's has stood strong as a centre of excellence for almost two centuries. We see this through its prestigious alumni such as Martin O'Neill, Baron Russell of Killowen, and Ciarán Hinds – to name a small few – who have gone on to



have massive impacts in their chosen fields. This reverence for our storied past is ever-present in the College's ethos, but equally, there is a welcoming embrace of the future. The addition of the Digital Hub shows that St. Malachy's always aims to improve and gives its students the best education possible.

As important as it is to recognise the excellent academic achievements of the College, this is not where our successes end. The school has always created an environment that allows sportsmen and musicians to grow and achieve great accomplishments in their discipline. In sixth form, there is the opportunity to participate in a wide array of extra-curricular activities in areas such as sports, music, and drama. The many achievements I have listed would not be possible without the excellent pastoral care that St. Malachy's provides. The College endeavours to ensure

QUB Pathways

The Pathway Opportunity Programme works with schools across Northern Ireland to provide an entry route to Queen's University Belfast for talented young people who have the ability to thrive at Queen's but need additional support and encouragement to fulfil their potential. A number of our pupils have been successfully supported through the Pathways programme availing of the additional financial, academic and practical support.

HE plus Programme

A number of pupils participate in the HE plus Programme run by the Education Services at the University of Cambridge (Corpus Christi College). This is a fantastic opportunity for students to expand and extend their subject knowledge beyond the curriculum. Students have the opportunity to undertake an academic research project, and receive additional information, advice and guidance about what universities have to offer and how to apply. They also experience lectures from Cambridge academics and university seminars, with students availing of a fully funded trip to Cambridge at the start of the summer.

Careers

The Careers Department is dedicated to the provision of **Careers Education Information Advice and Guidance** for all pupils at the College. It seeks to ensure that each pupil has access to a range of relevant, stimulating, personalised and supportive learning experiences to help him develop his self-awareness, explore appropriate career pathways, make well-informed decisions, and create, review and implement a suitable career plan. Pupils also follow a comprehensive **CEIAG** programme in Senior School with Careers classes scheduled fortnightly. The Careers Department enjoys excellent support from parents/carers, College alumni, the Careers Service, representatives from Further and Higher Education, employers from business and industry and a range of other relevant bodies.

In Year 13, pupils complete a work experience placement to help develop their awareness of the world of work and gain an insight into a chosen career. Support is further provided to our pupils through mock academic interviews, UCAS support, UCAT training, mentoring with alumni and through the HE plus scheme through Corpus Christi College, Cambridge University. A plethora of guest speakers from universities present to our pupils, as well as offer guidance and advice to help inform our pupils at this vital decision-making time.

The vast majority of our pupils go on to university to pursue exciting and competitive courses. Pupils are supported throughout the UCAS application process for UK universities and the CAO system for universities in the Republic of Ireland.

EMA

Based on the household income – some students will be eligible to receive EMA (£30 a week) while attending full-time education.

Application forms can be picked up from the College or through the Student Finance website directly. Please note that students must have a bank account in order to receive EMA. The process can take a few weeks so students should begin the application process as soon as they can.

This centre of excellence remains open well beyond school hours each evening and on Saturday mornings so that our young men can practise a healthy balance of relaxation and work, developing life skills and resilience to face the challenges of adulthood.

Extra Curricular

In my view, what makes St Malachy's unique is that the education goes beyond the classroom and whilst grades are important, the extracurricular activities are equally important in shaping men for the future. I have had the opportunity to experience this first hand when I took part in the John Paul II award last year. Through this programme I became a Eucharistic minister, read at mass and volunteered regularly in my local community. We also have an excellent Saint Vincent de Paul society who just recently organised a very successful Christmas Hamper appeal.

Sixth Form Prefect Team

All pupils in Year 13 have the opportunity to apply to be a Prefect or Senior Prefect in Year 14. The Senior Prefect Team mirrors the Senior Leadership Team and plays an important role in the life of the College. Student Council

Representatives on the council are elected annually from each year group and they consult widely with students on ways to make the College an even better place to learn. Public Speaking

Public Speaking offers pupils the skills to influence decisions and motivate change. It is an incredibly valuable asset for the future. Pupils have the opportunity to develop confidence and learn how to formulate persuasive arguments for their audience. Pupils in Sixth Form have participated in the Knights of Columbanus public speaking competition. The English and Religious Studies Departments have joined together to take part in the University of St. Andrews Ethics Cup. The Ethics Cup has a dual purpose: to promote interest in philosophy among secondary school students and to model and promote civil discourse on issues of public concern.

What is Servant leadership?

While servant leadership is a timeless concept, the phrase “servant leadership” was coined by Robert K. Greenleaf in *The Servant as Leader*, an essay that he first published in 1970 and essentially acknowledges that the best leaders are servants first.

“The servant leader is servant first...It begins with the natural feeling that one wants to serve, to serve first. Then conscious choice brings one to aspire to lead.

That person is sharply different from one who is leader first.”

At its heart, servant leadership is a leadership style that focuses on the needs of others before your own. It is a ‘values-led’ leadership and has become increasingly popular in many sectors including business and sport. It can be rooted in the example of Jesus – “Whoever wishes to become great among you must become your servant”

What does servant leadership look like?

A person of humility, honesty, integrity and credibility?

Servant leadership responds to the key principles of Catholic Social Teaching:

Young Enterprise

Sixth Form Pupils have the opportunity to participate in Young Enterprise empowering our pupils to discover, develop and celebrate their skills and potential. Pupils learn essential life skills including money management and entrepreneurship.



Music

Our Music Department operates a diverse programme of extra-curricular activities for all boys to engage in and develop key ensemble, listening and performing skills including Junior Choir, Senior Choir and Chamber Choir, Symphony Orchestra and Jazz Band, Senior and Junior String Orchestras, Senior and Junior Irish Traditional Groups, Brass Group, and a host of smaller chamber ensembles and rock bands. Instrumental and vocal tuition on a wide range of instruments is delivered through our very own Peripatetic Music Service, which caters for all orchestral instruments, voice, piano, organ, electric guitar, drum kit and Irish traditional instruments. Performance is central to musical training at the College and we offer many opportunities to 'practise' performance in formal and informal settings:

- The College has an impressive record of success

at music festivals across the country. We enter ensembles and soloists into competitions including Ballymena and Holywood Festivals.

- Annual events include the St. Malachy's Feast Day Mass in St. Patrick's Donegall Street, the Old Boys' Mass, the Friends of St. Malachy's Annual Ball, the Christmas and April Concerts, the Junior Concert, GCSE and A Level lunchtime concerts.
- Touring has been a regular feature since the College Orchestra performed at the Schools' Proms in London's Royal Albert Hall in 1999. Destinations have included the National Concert Hall in Dublin, Philadelphia, the Kennedy Centre in Washington, New York and Belgium.
- The College is proud of its long association with the City of Belfast School of Music, with whom

many boys currently study. We also have pupils who study at the Royal Irish Academy of Music, Dublin.

- St. Malachy's musicians represent the College in high-profile ensembles including the National Youth Orchestra of Ireland, the Ulster Youth Orchestra, Ulster Youth Choir, St. Peter's Cathedral Schola Cantorum, St. Polycarp's Choir, and various Musical Theatre schools.
- Performances at charity events, educational and community outreach events, and as part of Shared Education.
- Our ensembles are regularly hired by external agencies to provide background music and light entertainment.

Sport

St Malachy's College has an unrivalled reputation for excellence across a wide range of sports. The College is a recipient of a 'Sports Gold Mark,' awarded by the Sports Council for Northern Ireland in conjunction with the Department of Education, in recognition of excellence in the delivery of curricular Physical Education and provision of a varied extra-curricular sports programme.

Our extra-curricular sporting programme is wide, extensive and inclusive. Athletics, basketball, gaelic football, soccer, hurling, rugby and water polo are all sports played at a competitive level. We also compete in schools golf competitions. While we continue to have much success across a wide range of sports at local, national and international level, we encourage and value participation and commitment. College teams regularly travel and enjoy sporting and cultural exchanges to enrich the experiences of our students. A number of student are studying overseas, others are in the world of work and some are in the professional sporting ranks.

Sixth Form pupils are able to use and train in the College Fitness Suite, as well as participating in the vast array of sports.

Athletics

There is a long and distinguished tradition of athletics in the College, both in cross-country and in track & field. From Year 8 to Year 14, the boys train and compete regularly at District, Ulster and All Ireland level with a lot of success.

Basketball

Our basketball programme is one of the top schools programmes in Ireland. Teams train at least twice a week and play in All Ireland League and Cup competitions from Year 9 to Year 14.

Football

There is a very strong tradition of football in the College. High levels of participation regularly result in our teams being very competitive in both Belfast Schools competitions and Northern Ireland Schools competitions. College teams normally train once a week on our 4G pitch.

Gaelic

Each year group has a Gaelic team and the teams participate in the Ulster Schools competitions. Training is either before or after school and a number of the staff coaching are current or former county players.

Golf

In addition to running our own annual College Championship and a number of senior golf competitions throughout the year including the schools Winter League. Most recently the College hosted and competed against Monsignor Bonner golf team from Philadelphia on their Irish tour.

Hurling

Each year group has the opportunity to train after school and play in the Ulster Schools and Antrim Cup competitions.

Waterpolo

There is long tradition of Water polo in the College and we have a real reputation as being fearless and fair. Our Teams, here in the College are unique in that the older boys mentor and train the younger boys coming through.

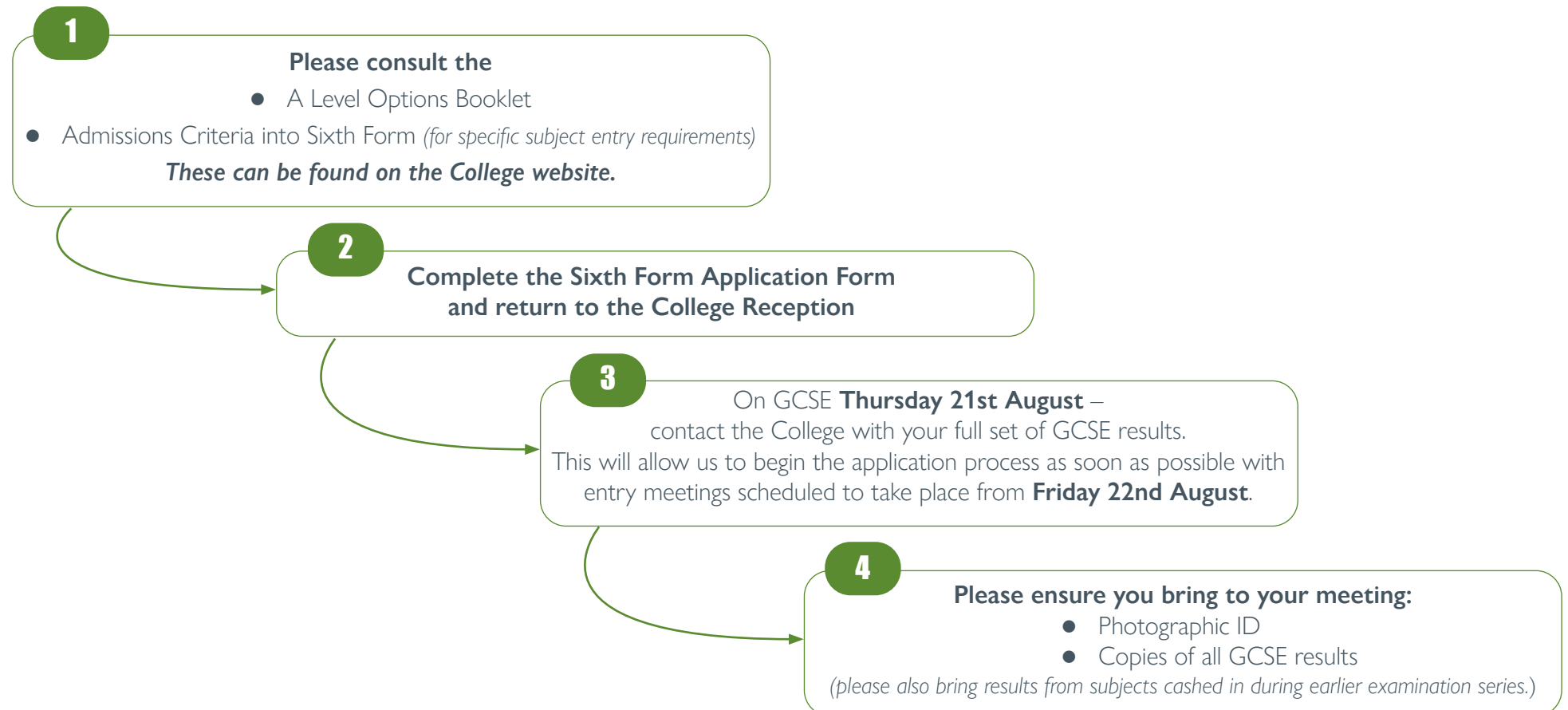
Future Aspirations:
